



WHAT IS A GARGOYLE?

You will find Gargoyle carvings in the woodwork of the Chamber. These were common features in Romanesque architectural buildings like the Legislative Assembly of Ontario! Gargoyles were often designed as waterspouts to redirect rainwater from rooftops. It is believed they were carved in the woodwork in the Chamber to scare away evil spirits. Fun Fact: The word gargoyle comes from the French word gargouille, meaning "throat," but which also describes the gurgling sound of water as it flows down a spout - similar to the sound you make when you gargle.

ACTIVITY STEPS

















WHAT YOU'LL NEED

For this activity, it helps if you have:

- A printed copy of the attached template
- Brown paper bag
- Scissors
- Glue
- Markers or crayons



STEP 1

PRINT, COLOUR, AND CUT YOUR TEMPLATE

Print a copy of the attached template. Use markers or crayons to colour in your template before cutting it. Make sure to cut out all of the pieces from the template. Don't forget the horns, arms, head, tail and ears!


ABOVE: A COLOURED

STEP 2

GET CREATIVE

Be creative and design an outfit or simply colour the body (paper bag) of the gargoyle. Use marker, crayons and even glitter to give your gargoyle some pizzazz!

STEP 3

BRING YOUR GARGOYLE TO LIFE

First, glue the horns and ears to the back of the head. Next, glue the head to the bottom flap of the paper bag. Then glue the arms and the tail to the back and sides of the bag.
