December 2, 2014.

Mr. Hudak — Enquiry of the Ministry — Would the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry indicate whether overpopulation of deer remains the primary justification for the native deer hunt in Short Hills Provincial Park, and if so, what has been the impact of the hunt on the deer population and what are the targets. December 2, 2014.

162. Mr. Hudak — Enquiry of the Ministry — Would the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry indicate the per-year dollar amount cost of enforcing and overseeing the native deer hunt in the Short Hills Provincial Park, as well as who would be liable if hunters were to inadvertently harm a man, woman, or child within the Park or beyond the designated hunting zone. December 2, 2014.

163.
